Letter from the Director

In 2016, the Homewood Library celebrated its 75th year of service to the Homewood Community and the citizens of Jefferson County. Over the decades the Homewood Public Library has evolved to serve the citizens of Homewood. From one tiny room in the old City Hall to its own building and then the move to the current facility, the Library has always strived to serve the community. From circulation of a few books in the first few decades, the Library now circulates a whole array of items, including Ukuleles! Collection use topped 638,000 this year.

The Library is open to the public seven days per week for a total of 67 hours per week. However our online services are available 24 hours per day. Patrons use our Library app to reserve books and to access our online services which include databases, eBooks, downloadable audio books, streaming videos, and online magazine subscriptions.

The Homewood Library is an award-winning Library and has been recognized at the State and National Levels. It is one of the busiest Libraries in the State of Alabama and has just under 40,000 visits per month.

A large part of the success of the Homewood Library is due to the fantastic group of dedicated employees who work together to fulfill our mission statement: "To bring people, information, and ideas together to enrich lives, build community and inspire lifelong learning." I am proud to work in the City of Homewood and serve as the Director of one of the best libraries in the State of Alabama and the nation.

This Annual Report provides a glimpse of the services we provided in 2016 and a taste for the great things coming in 2017.

Many community groups and businesses held their meetings and programs at Homewood Public Library in 2016. Over the course of the year, 1,787 meetings were held with an estimated attendance of 55,656 people.

The Homewood Public Library also has three study rooms for use on a first come, first serve basis. Between October 1, 2015 and September 30, 2016, these rooms were used a total of 1,620 times by 2,655 people.

As a member of the Jefferson County Library Cooperative Homewood Library’s patrons have access to two million items throughout the county. The Homewood Library itself houses a collection of over 99,000 items for use by the public.

In 2016 the Homewood Public Library circulated 638,534 items.

These items were checked out not only by Homewood Library’s 23,181 registered users but by library card holders throughout Jefferson County as well.

34,124 items were sent to other Jefferson County libraries to be checked out by their patrons.

24,201 items were sent to Homewood Public Library for checkout.

Additionally, Library staff answered 186,330 questions about resources, programs, and materials.

Technology



Technology At a Glance

The Homewood Public Library's Don E. Hatcher Technology Center offers public use of computers, a scanner, and a color printer, and free classes are held in the computer training lab. There are public use computers in every department.

In 2016, 72 classes were held in the training lab for 346 attendees.

Library computers were accessed by 47,215 patrons, primarily for internet and/or Microsoft Office use.

59,516 people brought their own laptops and devices and used the Library's free wifi.

In January the Homewood Public Library unveiled a new Krayon Kiosk (see left). This kiosk has been immensely popular and was used 22,234 times in 2016.

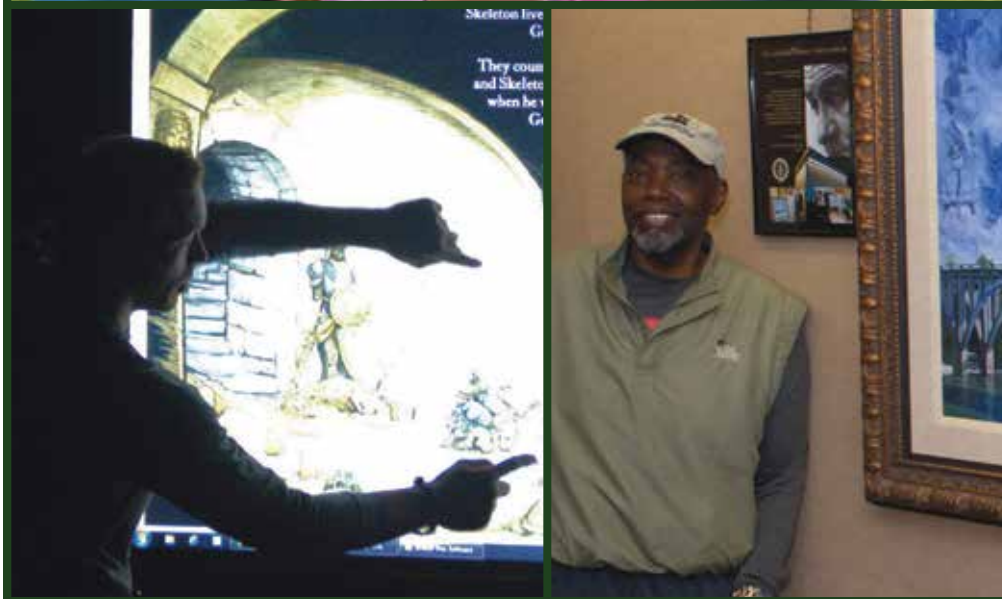
Community Involvement at a Glance

The Homewood Public Library's staff went into the community throughout the year in 2016.

Children's staff conducted 28 storytimes at schools, daycares, festivals, and farmer's markets.

Adult staff facilitated a book club at the Homewood Senior Center each month and met regularly with lunch attendees to talk about what was going on at the Library.

Library staff also conducted offsite library card registrations 10 times over the course of the year at farmer's markets, community meetings, and schools.

The Future



The Homewood Public Library is planning an expansion to better serve our community. This 3,000 square foot addition will be on the Ridge Road side of the Adult Services Department. It will relocate the Computer Services Department from the lower level to the main level of the Library, centralizing technology services for the public and providing easier access. The public computers currently in the Adult Department will be moved to the new Computer Department, making room for additional seating and shelving in the Adult Services Department. Extra study rooms, which are greatly needed by students using the Library, will be included in the expansion. The space freed up on the lower level will provide storage space for the Library as well as more meeting room space for use by the community. The expansion will also extend the current courtyard. This wonderful outdoor space is enjoyed year round by patrons reading books, using the Wi-Fi while they eat lunch, or simply enjoying the nice weather. Once enlarged, the courtyard may be used for small events and programs by the Library and the public.
